How do some Christians today follow the path of "Jesus or politics" by either withdrawing from or by rebelling against the present political system? What are the advantages and disadvantages of their position?
- 6. Why was everyone astonished by Jesus' answer? How does His answer show that His approach to politics is complicated and not simple? As an outsider rather than as an insider? As pursuing God's interests rather than human interests?
- 7. What are some ways we can follow Jesus' approach in our own involvement in politics today?
